To MICA's loyal family and friends,

Throughout the years, we have been able to successfully implement human and social development programs with a series of projects including the launch of the Project Apogee in 2009. One of our main goals as a non-profit organization is to increase the economic empowerment of women and improve the living standards of children living in rural areas of Niger. A goal MICA has successfully pursued for the past twenty years by providing at-risk and vulnerable women and their families with the necessary tools and skills to face the multiple educational and social challenges affecting their country today.

With the Project Apogee, we have provided moral and financial support to women through entrepreneurship, literacy, microcredit and agribusiness activities. Guided by mentors and role models, our beneficiaries are now better prepared to enter the workplace and connect with other aspiring business-oriented women. Today, we have over 1,400 women in the entire Maradi region who are involved in our various activities. Their participation in town-hall style meetings, microcredit group meetings, and workshops represents a powerful positive force for change in that area. We have also developed activities that provide additional business development skills including vegetable, fish and poultry farming as well as soap-making, sewing and cooking workshops in the villages of Bamo, Kontagora and Tarna. Our fish farms are unique and well-suited to the Maradi area, which is often plagued by drought, deforestation, and at times, food insecurity. These farms, and the low costs associated with their sustainability, are virtually self-sufficient and can survive harsh environmental climates. Combined with these already flourishing income generating activities, a new moringa production initiative has been recently introduced to our participants. This will become without any doubt another flourishing source of income for our female participants and their families. Moreover, many women who could not previously read or write have mastered the basics of education, such as signing their own name or performing basic mathematic applications – an important skill for operating their own small businesses. In addition, these women have also gained strong leadership qualities necessary for everyday life and particularly employment, and are now better able to know their rights.

MICA's innovation lies in our sustainability approach. Whenever possible, with all our projects, we try to develop a self-sustaining model where portions of the sales from women's projects are funneled back through the organization to maintain services and technical assistance. We also work within the local framework and try to take part in most of the decision-making process within the women's groups and only step in to provide technical assistance when needed. We also monitor the actions of the group to ensure that they set up a successful business model. By allowing women to make the decisions themselves, this gives them added confidence and skills to take more control over their lives and improve their families' living conditions. These empowering skills are something that they keep for a lifetime and in turn, can share with their children. Lastly, our success also lies in our local and international partnerships. Through the collaboration of MICA's long list of family and friends, including private donors such as Mrs. Heather Riesman, Mr. Michael Douglas and organizations such as ProLiteracy, SARED, AGADO, Aquaponics, Expanding Lives, Yaki da Talawci and the Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC), we hope to continue building an environment which facilitates the social and economic structures of Niger for years to come.

I. JOB SKILLS AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP TRAINING

MICA's activities for the year 2016 - 2017 were centered on Job Skill Training and Women Entrepreneurship activities including:

1. Job Skills and Entrepreneurship Training
2. Literacy Training
3. The Microcredit Program
4. Youth Cultural Exchanges

MICA's training centers are well-known establishments throughout the remote and hard to reach communities of the Maradi suburbs. Our staff trains and provided mentoring to poverty stricken women and girls through literacy, job and leadership skills trainings so they can gain their economic freedom. The overall goal is to continue this noteworthy mission. Women can turn their lives around, strengthen their power and ensure their own development and sustainability through these training programs. At the same time, they contribute to the development and sustainability of their living environment.

For its 2016 - 2017 activities, MICA has set up a significant number of activities within our training centers. The activities are mainly focused on entrepreneurship training for impoverished women and young girls who unfortunately dropped out of school. Most of our beneficiaries came from suburban areas and villages. The services included a full range of educational activities, specialized in entrepreneurship and agribusiness. Women have also began selling to local markets their used-clothes or clothing produced during the sewing classes.





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In Maradi, 31 female participants have now access to our workshops.

List of our courses and workshops

The center's classrooms are fully occupied every day. Various activities taking place in them for all our beneficiaries. Some of the activities such as cooking and art classes, are regularly held outdoors under a canopy whereas the sewing and dress design classes are held inside the center.

Our classrooms lessons included the following courses:

- Seamstress-Embroidery training
- Knitting
- The Art of Cooking





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- Cooking, Nutrition and Family Health
- Women Empowerment: Learning about the importance of educating young women
- Leadership training workshops
- Introduction to Farming
- Literacy Classes – Learn how to read and write in Hausa
- Soap Production and Distribution
- Awareness on the importance of Breast Feeding
- HIV/AIDs Awareness
- Malaria Prevention

Supporting the economic empowerment of our participants continues to be a top priority at our training centers. The key importance of our activities is to help in progressively building our female beneficiaries' capabilities to venture on their own, partake in their household finances and embark on independent business ventures, which will ultimately help them become self-sufficient and well-rounded individuals.

MICA believes that an improved standard of living for our participants and their families is being achieved as time goes by. Within and outside of our centers, our female beneficiaries get a chance to dialogue, to exchange and share their knowledge, and at the same time learn from each other's faults, apprehensions and hopes. This can only enrich the lives of our participants in the long run and serve as a confidence builder which will be passed on from their generation to new generations of women.

Challenges

- 1- Management workshops and professionalization programs for our staff members
- 2- Increasing the number of scholarships available for our trainees



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3- With the influx of women and young girls wishing to benefit from our programs every year, there is an urgent need to acquire new equipment and/or fix the inadequate and aging equipment such as the sewing machines, the embroidery machines, the tables, the benches, the stools etc...

II. LITERACY PROGRAM – Learning how to read and write in Hausa

Literacy training is embedded into all of MICA's programs, whether it is our job skill training program or the micro-credit program. Education is essential to the emancipation and empowerment of Nigerien women.

By learning the basics of education, meaning being able to read and write, we could intervene in a positive way into the lives of hundreds of women and families from rural areas to cities in Niger.

For the 2016 – 2017 period, 279 women benefitted from our literacy trainings and workshops including:



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- **55 women** from Maradi were involved in the program including the **31 women** taking part in the job skills and entrepreneurship program at the center in Maradi

- **124 women** from the Bamo village
- **30 women** from the Kontagora village
- **70 women** from the Tarna village
- All literacy trainings are provided in the dominant local language in the Maradi region which is **HAUSA**.

MICA has four training centers that provide literacy classes: one permanent center in Maradi and three traveling centers in the villages of Bamo, Kontagora and Tarna.



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- Our literacy program in the center of Maradi had two levels. It takes nine months to complete one level.
- Our literacy program in the villages of Bamo, Kontagora and Tarna have one level only. It takes six months to complete this level.

Because most learners are illiterate, during the first trimester of their training, we teach them first how to read and write.

Then, they learn basic mathematics and increase their vocabulary and writing skills in Hausa.

The modules used for these trainings are provided directly by the Department of Vocational Education and Literacy.

Challenges



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- 1- Lack of basic education from the women from the villages of Tarna, Bamo and Kontagora. The majority have never been to school. Only a handful know how to hold a pencil and chalk. These basic skills had to be taught first by our trainers, a step that was not foreseen prior to beginning the program which delayed the training schedule. This had an impact on the duration and budget of the program. Thus, we decided to slow down the training progress in order for all women to be at the same level.
- 2- In Niger, you are considered as an adult at the age of 30. The age difference between the women participants became a challenge. Specific social pressures and realities of Niger had to be considered to pursue the program. We had to provide an open space where both groups could express themselves and openly speak without shame or fear. To avoid conflicts, we divided the women into two classes: one for the adult women (30+) and the other class for younger women (ages 15-30). This allowed for the younger crowd to easily open up and talk about subjects that they would not have necessarily discussed in the presence of adults.
- 3- We didn't envisage that many women from outside the program would want to participate in the literacy trainings. The number of participants increased from 200 planned beneficiaries to 279.
- 4- Another difficulty lies in the location of our classrooms at the village level which weren't strategically located. To fix this problem, our group leaders sent letters to the village chiefs requesting places/plots for the construction of hangars (sheds). And their demands were approved immediately. We are now waiting for the constructions to be finalized.



III. THE MICROCREDIT PROGRAM

This program was developed to extend credit to rural women's groups to finance income generating activities at the village level. Microcredit activities including the following:

- Small business development and management
- Farming activities
- Arts and Craft activities
- Micro-enterprises

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The overall objective is to reduce the vulnerability of our female participants and to finance activities that would provide them with regular income. This will improve their quality of life and the access to education for their children especially their daughters.

For the year 2016 -2017:

- **343 women** separated into **thirty-five (35) groups** took part in the Microcredit Program;
- including **70 women** in the village of Tarna;
- **50 women** in the village of Kontagora;
- and **223 women** in the village of Bamo.

All these women have benefited from credit to finance income generating activities. A variety of products were produced and sold to local markets by our beneficiaries such as used clothing, Nigerian traditional dishes, spices, salt, peanut paste, fish, moringa, cakes, meat, goats, sheep, pottery, bags, paintings, embroideries, peanut oil etc.

Challenges

- 1- Non-compliance by some groups with loan repayment periods.
- 2- We also admitted untrained members, who do not fully understand the dynamics of the grouping.
- 3- Difficulties in granting credit to 200 new women on our waiting lists due to insufficient funds available. So far only 150 women could be served with loans. 183 women are still waiting on their loans and 250 women are on a waiting list for next year.



IV. YOUTH CULTURAL EXCHANGES

To promote the education of young girls and women, for more than nine years now, MICA Inc. has been partnering with the US-based organization, **Expanding lives**, a nonprofit organization which helps young women from West Africa develop the voice, the self-confidence and the problem solving skills necessary for empowerment of themselves and their families through cultural exchanges.

Every year, two (2) to five (5) girls from Niger get a chance to visit the great city of Chicago and attend a six-week literacy, cultural, and language training program during which they develop skills and relationships building activities with American girls.

Participants received a minimum of 12 hours of instruction in each of the following areas: leadership and problem solving, participatory democracy, computer skills, health including first aid certification and HIV/AIDS awareness and advocacy.

Additional hours include English classes and sessions in organizing meetings, writing grants, yoga and meditation, peer mediation and environmental studies. They also get to travel and partake in several excursions and outings with high school and college students.

Between 2008 and 2016, twenty-four (24) girls have attended the program.





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- **Payment of school fees**

To encourage the integration of young girls in schools and/or the continuing education of girls in secondary school, MICA-Expanding Lives pays for the school enrollment fees and provides small grants to a selected group of girls to help them pay for supplies and transportation to their schools.

This year, MICA-Expanding Lives have paid the school registration fees for **fifteen (15) young girls ages 15+ enrolled in various secondary and tertiary institutions in Niger.**

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- **Organization of mini-conferences**

In Niger, youth especially girls between the ages of 12 and 15 years (6th grade and up) are most likely to drop out of schools because of an early marriage and others because they cannot juggle between school and domestic work.

The objective of these mini-conferences is to encourage young girls from this group to continue their education and become leaders in their community. During these conferences, they are introduced to leadership trainings, peer mediation, yoga classes, health and nutrition courses, English classes and partake in discussions on the challenges facing young girls particularly with regards to education in Niger.

From August 22 – 27, 2016, MICA and Expanding Lives invited thirty (30) girls, grades 5 to 6, from five



(5) different schools to participate in a mini-conference in Aguié (Maradi region).



V. ON THE DRAWING BOARD

1. To develop the production, processing, marketing and exportation of Moringa in the village of Tarna by training a women's cooperative.
2. For the coming three years, provide loans to at least **650 additional women** to start businesses in the Maradi region and throughout Niger.
3. Enable our current literacy program participants to continue training **for 6 more months** and offer the opportunity to **150 new women participants** to attend the program.
4. Extend our programs to other at-risk and vulnerable regions such as Diffa and Agadez.
5. Create activities to increase youth employment and leadership in regions like Maradi, Diffa, Tillabéri and Agadez where youths are easily recruited by violent extremist groups such as Boko Haram and Al Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb (AQIM).
6. Develop new programs for adult learners in Niger. A few years back, the Nigerien government awarded **MICA with a 4000m² building plot to reward the organization for their hard work with women and young girls in the country**. We decided to utilize this plot for the creation of an institution for adult continuing education in Niamey. The main targets will be youth dropouts (girls and boys over 15 years of age) as well as generally poor or socially disadvantaged women and men with little to no education. In Niger, formal education alone is not sufficient in developing a labor-force and managerial know-how that can compete in today's global economy. For this reason, this adult education center will also provide individuals with certain skills and/or diplomas to receive updated, re-skilled or brand new trainings (ex: electricians, maids, cooks, literacy classes, languages courses, film production and editing, hotel management, catering etc.). We are currently waiting on approval from the government before beginning the construction of this educational institution. Each department in the school will be named after one of our funding partners. The educational institution will be named the **Apogee Center for Continuing Education**.
7. Ameliorate MICA's communication practices and increase the organization's e-reputation on a local and international level with a main goal of gaining more funding and donations to prolong our activities in Niger.
8. Our goal with **the Project Apogee for second part of the year 2017-2018** will also include:
 - Providing awareness to more adult women about our programs.
 - Promoting the welfare of elderly women through literacy with themes relevant to their concerns.
 - Organize elderly women's groups to increase their attendance at the literacy centers and explain the importance of attending continuing education centers.



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VI. CONCLUSION

To maintain the successful implementation of all our programs and activities, MICA needs the continued support of its donors and friends.

Today, we have **1,496 women** in the entire Maradi region who are involved in our various activities.

Without the compassionate intervention of MICA's friends and partners, these women will be forced to drop out of school, enter into early marriage and/or abandon their already fruitful businesses. And their children will also be affected. Many will end up on the streets leading a delinquent life or performing agricultural tasks to help the family farm. Some will be coerced into joining violent extremist groups who promise food, money and a way out of poverty. Many will see their academic potential and dreams for a brighter future vanish.

MICA is actively seeking technical resources from the Nigerien government. We are also in the process of creation of women cooperatives for Moringa processing and exportation. We are already in touch with the MCA-Niger (Millennium Challenge Account-Niger) for the support in that activity area.

Due to funding problems, MICA's program was only allowed to do half of its intended goals. Not all our microcredit activities and new ideas could be fully implemented and that had a large effect on many of the women involved in the program. With your donation, MICA will be able to do much more such as increasing its number of beneficiaries and adding new equipment and materials for our classrooms.
